



National context



- National leadership in urban systems: a policy vacuum
- Under-investment in infrastructure nationally
- Calls for investment in our cities and improved governance arrangements

National Strategic Priorities



- Expand Australia's productive capacity
- Increase Australia's productivity
- Diversify Australia's economic capabilities
- Build on Australia's global competitive advantages
- Develop our cities and regions
- Reduce greenhouse gas emissions
- Improve social equity, and quality of life, in our cities and regions

Infrastructure Australia – process+features

- Rigorous approach to drive national productivity
- Collaborative approach with industry, government and the community
- Public and private sector on the Board working together <u>in the</u> <u>national interest</u>
- Strong political support
- Longer-term pipeline of projects plus strategic policy agenda



Infrastructure Australia – City Issues

- Broader emphasis including congestion, liveability, sustainability
- Planning and Governance:
- "A lack of appropriate governance frameworks underlies many planning and infrastructure delivery problems within Australia's major cities"



Transforming our Cities




- Major Cities Unit

A National Urban Policy



- A long-term strategic framework for the sustainable development of our cities
- Vision: <u>Through good governance</u>, <u>our cities</u> <u>are productive</u>, <u>liveable and sustainable</u>
- Articulate expectations, responsibilities, strategies and actions of governments, the private sector and the community required to transform our urban systems
- Sign-on from the 8 May Local Government and Planning Ministers Council

- Economy, productivity and innovation
- The pattern of urban settlement

- Ensure planning arrangements are able to effectively deliver on the broader national urban development policy.
