

Public **ROAD-RELATED FAPENDITURE* and revenue in Australia 1998

- Ownership and control of the road system lies with the states and territories. However, road expenditure
 in Australia is financed by all three levels of government. At present the Commonwealth Government's
 direct road funding responsibilities are the construction and maintenance of the 18 700 km National
 Highway System, Roads of National Importance (RONIs) and the Black Spot road safety program. The
 Commonwealth Government also supplements state and territory expenditure on arterial and local
 roads through general revenue assistance.
- The total amount of road-related expenditure by the Commonwealth, state, territory and local governments in 1996–97 was \$6.2 billion.
- Revenue collected by the Commonwealth, state and territory governments from a selection of motor vehicle taxes and charges in 1996–97 was \$13.9 billion.
- Presentation in this Information Sheet of government road-related expenditures together with motor
 vehicle revenues does not imply that there is, or should be, any direct linkage between the two. On
 the contrary, revenue collected by governments from most taxes and charges on motor vehicles is paid
 into consolidated revenue accounts, along with income from other sources.
- Between 1994–95 and 1996–97, the BTCE index of the prices for inputs to road construction and maintenance increased by 1.9 per cent while road-related spending increased by 10.8 per cent. Much of the increase in government spending during this period were therefore 'real' rather than inflationary.



New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland account for most of the road-related expenditure in Australia. Including Commonwealth grant money, they spent \$2.2 billion, \$1.1 billion and \$1.6 billion respectively in 1996–97.

ustralian Land Transport Grants, amounting to \$801.2 million in 1996–97, are the largest single source of road funds provided by the Commonwealth to the states.



Motor vehicle revenue

The Commonwealth and state and territory governments levy taxes and charges on motor vehicle users in Australia. The total amount raised in 1996–97 was \$13.9 billion, of which \$8.6 billion (62 per cent) was from Commonwealth petroleum products excise duty.

State and territory governments raised \$2.1 billion (15 per cent) from vehicle registration fees in 1996–97. This is their largest source of motor vehicle revenue. Stamp duty collected on vehicle registration fees raised \$1.1 billion, and fuel franchise fees raised \$1.6 billion.

Selected motor vehicle taxes and charges 1996–97



Following the High Court judgment in Ha and Lim v. New South Wales and Walter Hammond and Associates Pty Ltd v. New South Wales, delivered on 5 August 1997, the Commonwealth has, since 7 August 1997, collected 8.1 cents per litre in additional excise on petrol and diesel. The additional excise is collected on behalf of the states and territories, who in turn make rebates or refunds to producers and wholesalers in order to leave them in the same position as they were under the previous system of state-imposed business franchise fees.

he following tables present road expenditure and revenue as time series broken down into specific categories of interest. Expenditure is distributed by state and territory, and revenue from selected motor vehicle taxes and charges is shown by major source at the Commonwealth, state and territory government levels.
